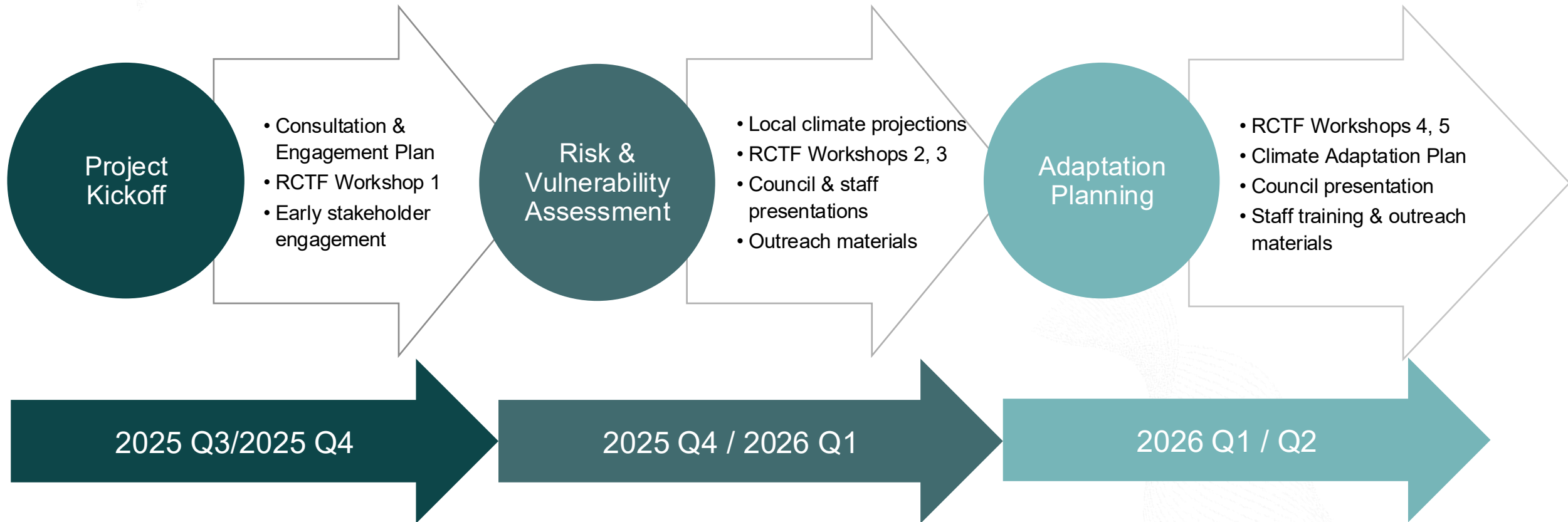
Land Acknowledgement

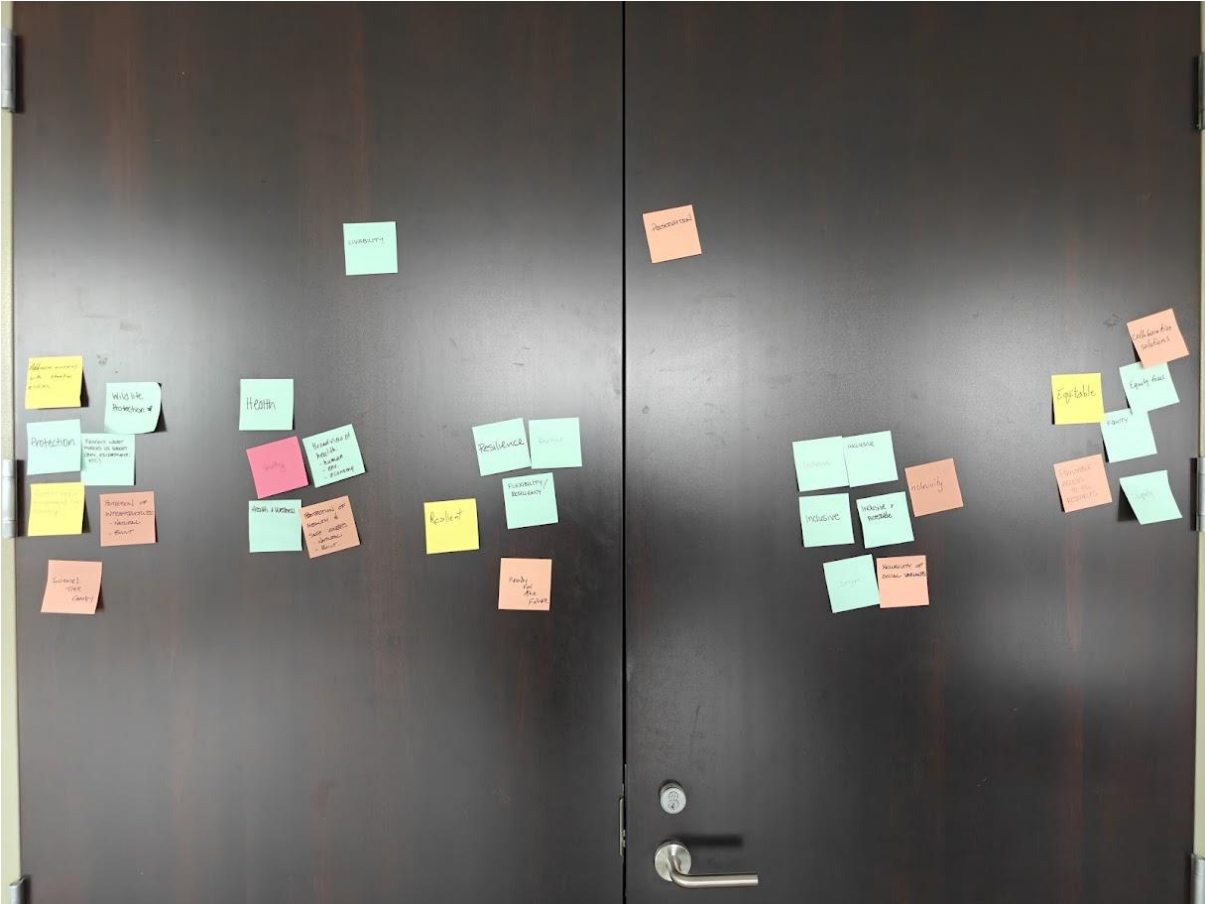
Vision & Goal Refresher

Draft Vision Statements

Option 1: Collingwood is adapting to climate change together, as a community where everyone belongs, everyone is safe, and the benefits of a healthy environment and resilient services reach every resident, neighbourhood, and generation.

Option 2: Collingwood is preparing for the future. Through practical, accountable, and community-supported action, we will protect the people, places, and resources we value.

Option 3: Collingwood is a resilient, inclusive, and healthy community, protecting the bay, the escarpment, and each other as our climate changes.

Option 4: Collingwood is adapting to a changing climate so that our people, our natural surroundings, and the services and places we share remain healthy, safe, and thriving, today and for generations to come.

Services & Operations: Reliable, affordable, climate-ready Town systems and services.

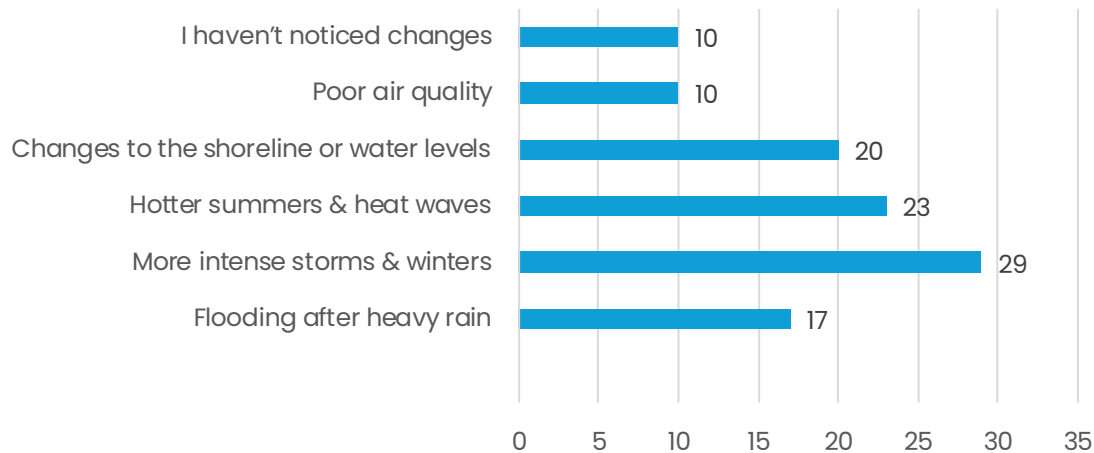
Natural Environment: Protected, restored, functioning natural systems that are integrated into the Town's infrastructure network, and support service delivery.

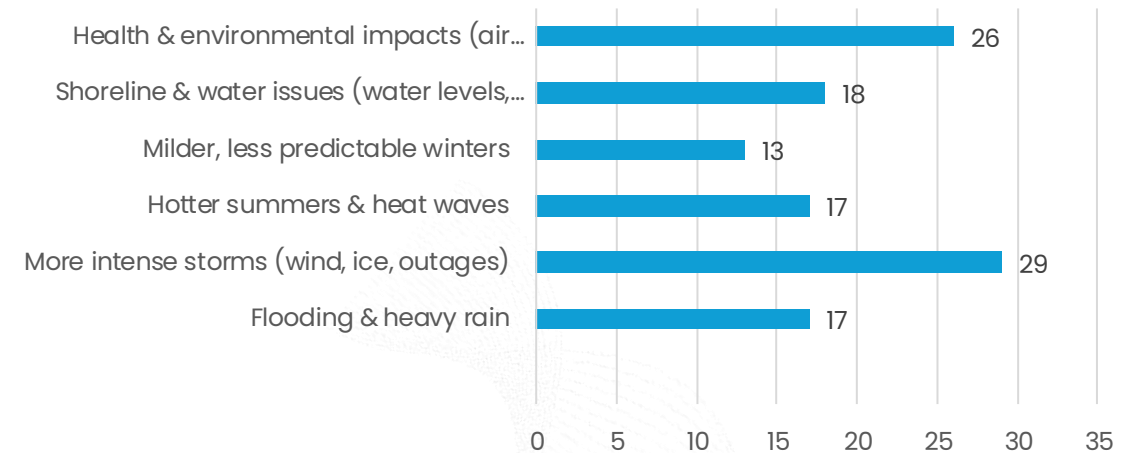

What weather changes have you experienced in Collingwood? Choose all that apply..

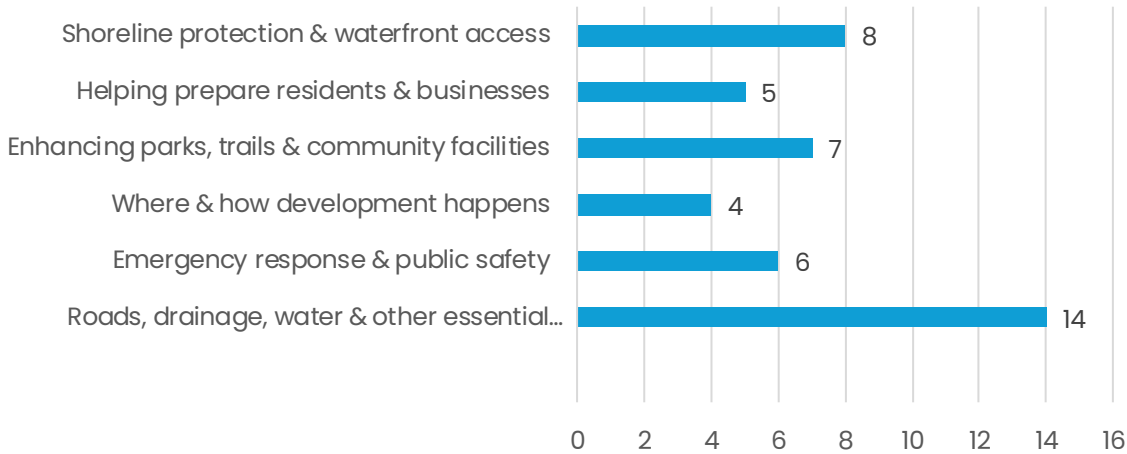


What climate-related changes concern you the most? Pick up to 3.

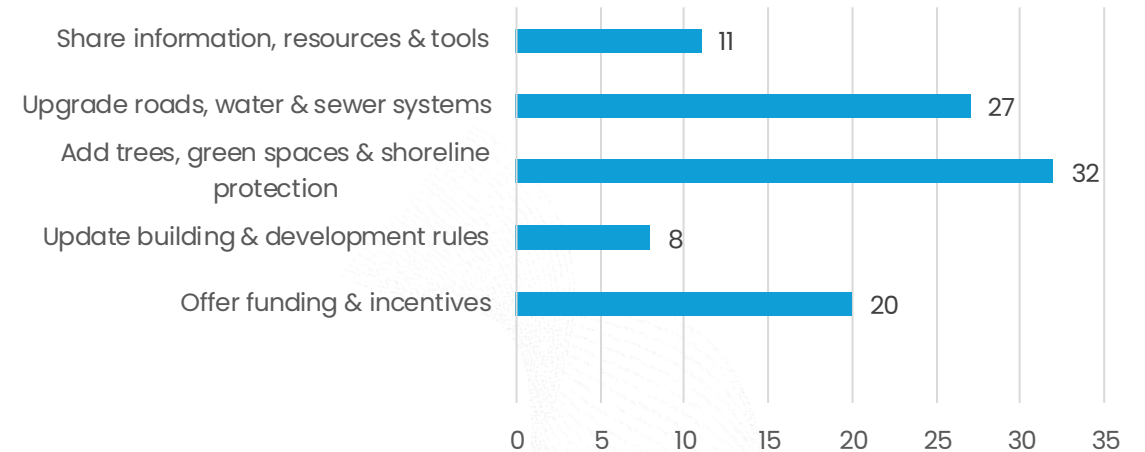


Key Engagement Findings
